My fellow Constituents:

There has been much a flutter about Clayton County potentially regaining public transportation. As many of you may recall, I have been an advocate of light rail and commuter rail since prior to my election. Earlier this year, when our state legislatures approved Clayton County's ability to call for a referendum during the General Election allowing citizens to vote on whether they would be taxed for an additional penny on the dollar for transportation services in order to join a metropolitan transit authority, the ball bounced into the courts of your Board of Commissioners. Since the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority (“MARTA”) is

the only metropolitan transit authority in this state, there was only one question, “Will the Clayton County Board of Commissioners vote to approve a referendum for the citizens to vote on whether to join MARTA at the full penny?”

For several weeks each individual Commissioner met with MARTA representatives and the BOC held two specially called meetings prior to our initial vote on July 1, 2014. We were presented with varying figures as to how much money would be collected on the additional 1 penny and the cost of providing service to Clayton County for both bus service and a rail extension service. Apart of the plan to extend rail service to Clayton was the proposed ability to run our trains on the rail lines owned and operated by Norfolk Southern.

At the June 30, 2014, meeting I specifically asked Keith Parker, CEO and GM of MARTA, “what happens if Norfolk Southern doesn't allow us to use their tracks...”

He advised that we would have other rapid transit options. Subsequently to that Monday, June 30th meeting, I was notified that the Chief Financial Officer of MARTA had received communication from Norfolk Southern indicating that the plans, cost and deadlines for use of their freight tracks was speculative and without further study would not likely be an option for Clayton County.

Given the very narrow time frame that we were presented with to render a decision, I proposed an amendment to the MARTA contract that would allow for Clayton County to use ½ of the penny for buses and ½ of the penny to be held in an interest bearing escrow account for the sole purpose of providing rail extension to Clayton County. (The escrow account can only be used by and for the Clayton Extension service.) MARTA agreed with the amendment and this very important and vital protection for Clayton County drove the discussions on MARTA doing business with Clayton County.

On July 1, 2014 at the BOC's regularly scheduled board meeting with a 3-2 vote, the BOC approved a contract that would call for the levy of only a ½ penny. I voted in opposition of that proposal. The Chairman of MARTA attended the meeting and he advised the BOC that he was not confident that the members of the MARTA would vote to allow Clayton County to become a member of MARTA given that all other jurisdictions apart of MARTA were being taxed at a full penny. On July 2, 2014, MARTA rejected Clayton's contract for ½ penny and further advised that they would provide no service to Clayton County without a full penny being levied. This meant Clayton County would have no public transportation if we did not reconsider our position. Notwithstanding, an overwhelming majority of citizens who reached out to the Commissioners asked that we approve a contract with MARTA for 1 penny.

On Saturday, July 5, 2014, with a 3-1 vote (one of the board members was absent) we voted to allow the citizens of Clayton County to decide if they wanted to be taxed an extra penny per dollar on some purchases. That referendum (vote on the ballot) will be during the General Election in November.

As a Commissioner, I accept that we are fiduciaries of taxpayer dollars. That responsibility I don't take lightly. Furthermore, we must be fiscally responsible; thus the needed protection clause in the MARTA contract that permits the portion of funds to be placed into an account just for Clayton County was added. We ensured that an extra \$23Million per year will be placed into an account for us when the planning and implementation of the rail can begin.

Now, the ball has been lobbed to you the people, to determine your fate. You must determine if you want an additional 1 penny to be levied on your retail sales. Will you or won't you is the \$48 Million Question. To view the Clayton County Board meetings please visit www.ClaytonTV23.com.

Clayton County Access Television Adds AT&T U-verse Channel 99

Jonesboro, Georgia (June 26, 2014) — Clayton County Board of Commissioners announces that the county's local government access station – *Clayton County Access Television* (CCTV) – is now available to AT&T U-verse® Digital TV subscribers on Channel 99. CCTV has been accessible through Comcast since 2004 and can currently be viewed on Comcast Channel 23. The project was completed in collaboration with the CCTV staff and the county's Department of Information Technology.

The combined television access through Comcast and now AT&T expands opportunities for more residents in Clayton County to tune into their county government to learn about changes in government, programs, resources and events. CCTV, which showcases local government programming such as re-televised board meetings and upcoming events, will be available to all AT&T U-verse TV subscribers in Clayton County, as well as those residing outside the county.

“Having CCTV programming carried by AT&T U-verse will greatly expand access to the valuable programming created to keep our residents informed about the community. We continue to enhance the capabilities of our television station and are extremely excited about this addition.” said GlenNeta Griffin and Lindsey DeLong, Station Managers

Clayton County is the eighth county in Georgia to add the new channel. Unlike other cable TV systems, Clayton County Access Television does not have its own dedicated channel on U-verse. Instead, AT&T groups all Public, Education and Government (PEG) channels on



From Food to LED Technology, Clayton County is on the Move!

Major Industry Announcements Bringing Nearly Two Thousand Jobs to Clayton County

Metro Atlanta is buzzing with great news about Clayton County. It's hard to pick up a newspaper or see a news report without hearing about all the new job activity and progress in our community. Never before in our county's history have we seen the unprecedented amount of new investment and job creation that we are seeing right now. While the county still has its fair share of challenges to deal with, the new job generation and the millions in new investment are going a long way to giving our citizens access to better job opportunities, with higher pay and good benefits.

Below, we have highlighted a few of the more recent announcements:

Chime Solutions to Hire 1,120 New Jobs at Call Center at Southlake Mall

On June 2nd, Governor Nathan Deal and a team of community and economic development leaders announced one of the largest new-job-generating private sector companies ever to come to Clayton County. Chime Solutions Inc, an outsourcing firm for business processes that specializes on contractor staffing solutions and contact center services, will create more than 1,120 jobs at a new call center operation in Morrow.

Chime Solutions, a minority- and woman-owned business, will locate to the former JC Penney building at Southlake Mall in Morrow. The 65,000-square-foot facility will become a state-of-the-art call center. The open positions at the call center will include executive, administrative, supervisory and customer service. The type of work will be primarily call center services, which include customer care phone support, help desk and technical support, and seasonal-based service projects that Chime Solutions will fulfill on behalf of its clients. Hiring will begin by the end of the summer.

Quarter-of-a-Billion Dollar Kroger Distribution Center Coming to Ft. Gillem

Just days after the exciting news about Chime Solutions, Kroger, one of the world's largest food retailers, announced it will build a \$250 million distribution center on about 300 acres at the former Army post of Ft. Gillem, now known as the Gillem Logistics Center, in Forest Park.

The new distribution center will employ somewhere between 700 and 900 people upon opening, but the expectation is that the number of jobs will eventually rise to close to 1,500. Kroger and city officials plan to have the center operational by September of 2015.

This is a huge boost to the redevelopment efforts at Ft. Gillem, and is already spurring new development discussions by housing builders, retailers and other companies who want to be located close to this job-generating area. Hundreds of acres of developable property still exist on the base, and other major companies are taking a strong look at opening new facilities there. City and county officials hope to attract at least another 1,000 – 2,000 new jobs, and hundreds of millions more in new investment.

Clayton County Lands First Korean Corporate Headquarters

A Korean LED manufacturer is opening their first US operation in the Forest Park area of Clayton County. AVICS USA, LLC announced last week at a Board of Commissioners meeting that they will be opening their U.S. Headquarters for parent company AVICS Korea, who is a pioneer in designing, manufacturing and distributing innovative LED lighting products.

Based in Suwon-City, South Korea, AVICS Korea was founded in 1998 and offers more than 50 different LED products. The company is initially opening a sales, showroom and distribution facility in the Southfield Corporate Center near Forest Park. "AVICS headquarters operation will employ 25 new positions," said Clayton County Economic Development Director Grant Wainscott. "However, their desire is to open a large manufacturing plant in Clayton County within the next two years that could employ hundreds."

The Clayton County Office of Economic Development worked closely with the Georgia Department of Economic Development's (GDEcD) Global Commerce/International Projects Team, the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, Georgia Power's Economic Development team, and Clayton County Sheriff Victor Hill, to lure the headquarters operation to Clayton County and Metro Atlanta. This is the first Korean company to open a headquarters in Clayton County.

British Firm Expands US Headquarters in Clayton County

On June 9th, the Clayton County Office of Economic Development & Film announced that a global freight forwarding operation is completing its move to the Mountain View Opportunity Zone near Hartsfield-Jackson Airport, nearly doubling in size. Future Forwarding, whose parent company is in the UK, is expanding its US Headquarters operation into more than 140,000 square feet in the Atlanta Tradeport global commerce park off CW Grant Pkwy, bringing with them more than 60 employees.

"We began here in Atlanta as a traditional freight forwarder, and have now broadened our range of services to encompass the whole supply chain," said Colin Smith, Future Forwarding's President. "The proximity to the airport drew us to Clayton County to start; as we grew and needed more space, we were fortunate to remain in the county, now even closer to where our clients want us to be."

At a recent tour of the new facility, Clayton County Commission Chairman Jeff Turner thanked Future Forwarding for their business. "On behalf of the Clayton County Board of Commissioners, I want to thank you for your investment in Clayton County," he said. "The fact that you would entrust your entire US Headquarters operational history to Clayton County speaks volumes about the partnership we have established, and the viability of this region as a global business hub."

Future Forwarding launched their first US presence, in Clayton County, in 2001. "Back then, we only had a staff of four people, and we were in barely 2,000 square feet on Old Dixie Highway," reminisced Smith. "We have experienced considerable growth since 2004 and have continually adapted to customer requirements which has led us to source additional space and move to the next phase in our firm's history."

Established as Atlanta's first certified Foreign Trade Zone, the Atlanta Tradeport is home to a large number of International logistics and freight firms, customs houses and airport-related businesses. In 2009, Clayton County established a Tax Allocation District in the Mountain View area, which includes Tradeport. Two years later, the Department of Community Affairs awarded the county with its first Opportunity Zone. Since that time, a flurry of new businesses and expansion of existing firms has helped make the Mountain View area one of the most active in the entire airport sub-market.

Tips for Responsible Pet Ownership

- Have ALL your pets spayed or neutered.
(Breeding is unlawful without a permit in Clayton County)
- Microchip your dogs and/or cats.
(This will help reunite you with your pet quicker in the event you are separated)
- Maintain a current picture of your pet in case it gets lost.
- If your pet is lost, visit the Clayton County Animal Shelter immediately. Stray animals with no ID tags are only held for three days.
- Your pet is required to have a rabies shot EACH year AND you are required to display that tag on a collar that is being worn by your pet.
- Animals may not be tied to any fixed object. This is called tethering and is illegal!
- Animals must have proper food, shelter and fresh clean water at ALL times.
- Never leave small children unattended with any pet.
- Female dogs that are "in season" or "in heat" must be kept inside by local law.
- Take your pet to a veterinarian annually for flea treatment, heartworm checks and other intestinal worms.

(Clayton County Ordinance Code Sec 62-11)



CURFEW HOURS:

SUNDAY through THURSDAY

11 p.m.— 6 a.m. the following day

FRIDAY and SATURDAY

Midnight— 6 a.m. the following day

This applies to any person 17 years old or under.

How do I get a library card?



PINES library cards are free to all residents of Georgia, including those who live in areas of the state served by a library that does not participate in the [PINES network](#). People who attend school, own property, or are employed in Georgia but who live out-of state are also eligible for a free PINES card. Most PINES cards are valid for two (2) years from date of application. Library card applicants need to come to any one of our libraries and complete and sign an application form. Identification must be presented to register for a library card.

There are three possible combinations of identification possible in order to get a library card:

Option 1:

Photo ID (such as valid driver's license) showing current local address.

Option 2:

Photo ID that does not have current address plus an item from the list below that does show the current local address.

Option 3:

Two items from the list below that both show the same, current, local address.

Examples of acceptable ID for options 2 and 3 include:

- A current, valid driver's license
- A current, valid voter registration card
- A valid matricula consular (2004.08)
- A check with a pre-printed address
- A utility bill, tax receipt, or lease, or other piece of mail that shows the user's name and current address.

Library card applications are not accepted during the last 15 minutes of each work day, so please be sure to sign up for your card early!


Georgia property owners who do not reside in the state may be required to show proof of ownership such as a tax bill or deed. Persons employed in Georgia or attending school in Georgia but who live out-of-state may be required to show proof of employment or enrollment. Out-of-state cards are available for an annual fee of \$25.00.

There is no minimum age for a child to receive a PINES card. A parent or legal guardian must register for his or her child, if the child is under 18 years of age. The parent or legal guardian needs to show his or her own proper identification to register a child, and he or she must sign the child's application. A child's parent or guardian is responsible for materials borrowed by his or her child.



Information Technology staff is working with the Library System to redesign the Library's website making it easier to navigate while providing links to the many services offered by the Library.

⇒ Sheriff's Inmate Release Debit Card Processing:

Information Technology staff is working with the Sheriff's Department to replace their current check issuance process with a debit card issuance. Upon release from jail, the inmate's balance would be transferred to a debit card.

⇒ Solicitor General Post Conviction Victim Notification:

Information Technology staff is working with the Solicitor General's Victim Services unit to automate the printing of a letter to victims of crime notifying them prior to release of an inmate after conviction and time served.

⇒ State Court Clerk Customer Facing Monitors:

Information Technology staff is working with the Clerk of State Court to install customer facing Point-of-sale touch screen monitors for confirmation of customer (i.e. defendant) name, citation information, and payment amount. The Clerk feels that this would be an appropriate measure to reduce the incidence of fine payments being credited to the wrong citation, which could result in the customer wrongly being arrested on a bench warrant for nonpayment of a citation or fine.





KEEPING A DISORDERLY PLACE



Ordinance No. 2014 –120

Sec. 62—47

- a) It shall be unlawful for a person or persons in control of real property in the County by commission or omission to keep or maintain a common ill-governed and disorderly place, to the common disturbance of the neighborhood.
- b) "A common ill-governed and disorderly place" is defined as a place where gaming, drug use, drug sales, prostitution, disorderly conduct, loud parties, gun fire, assaults, robberies, or any combination of these occur with a frequency of more than four times in a twelve month period.
- c) Among the circumstances which may be considered in determining a violation of this subsection are: the frequency of citizen complaints, prior warnings to the person or persons in control of the premises to curtail illegal activities on the premises, frequency of arrests or investigations or repeated calls for police services at the location. A "common disturbance of the neighborhood" will require complaints by no less than two different citizens not living in the same address within a twelve month time period.
- d) For the purpose of this section, the meaning of "place" shall mean any real property within Clayton County regardless of the zoning classification of the property.
- e) The person or persons in control of real property shall be the individual or individuals who own said real property or if said person or persons is (are) renting the premises shall be the person or persons who has a lease agreement for said premises or the manager, other legal representative of the owner, renter or lessee.
- f) A violation of this section shall be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not exceeding \$1,000.00 or six months imprisonment, or both, except as otherwise provided by general law.


